APIPP Announces Free Invasive Species Identification, Survey, and Management Trainings

Keene Valley, NY June 2018 – The Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program (APIPP) is offering a series of free training sessions this summer to help protect Adirondack forests and waters from the harmful impacts of invasive species. These workshops are free and open to the public. Participants will learn how to identify, survey for, and manage invasive species currently threatening the Adirondack region, such as Common Reed Grass and Eurasian watermilfoil, as well as those that pose significant risk to the region but have not yet arrived such as hydrilla and Japanese stiltgrass. APIPP will demonstrate the best practices that everyone can utilize. In addition to trainings, APIPP will also be offering a free, open to the public, Innovations in Invasive Species Prevention, Early Detection, and Management Summit. The kick-off event, an aquatic invasive species ID and survey training followed by an MapInvasives training, are scheduled for June 19, and will give citizen scientists the information they need to know how to identify, survey, and report infestations to a statewide database. The summaries below provide an overview of the events available from June through July.
